Climate: Temperatures range from an average of 24°C (75°F) in summer to 16°C (60°F) in winter

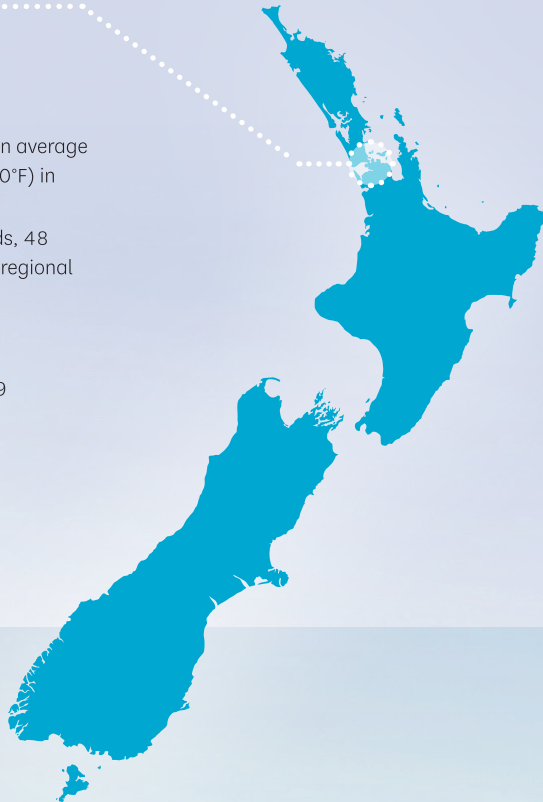
